




President's Report

Martine not only took us on a photographic journey but also gave us an insight into the experiences of dealing with UN peacekeeping missions in conflict zones.


The situations of dealing with political struggles, the Ebola crisis, the aftermath of war, along with capturing images whilst maintaining security, was an absorbing presentation.

June 7th Education Night A Night with Nick

A night not to miss with Nick Melidonis demonstrating how to edit and improve your images with various tricks and techniques.

As a corporate trainer and teacher in the past, he enjoys sharing and teaching about his journey in photography and have always been a keen explorer of the creative process of what makes a successful photographic image.

Nick is one of only three photographers to have won the AIPP 'Australian Professional Landscape Photographer of the Year' three times. Nick was awarded the West Australian Professional Landscape Photographer of the Year in 2005. He is also the 2011, 2013 and 2015 runner-up to the 'Australian Travel

Photographer of the Year'. In 2002, Nick achieved a Master of Photography from the AIPP and is currently an M. Photog. V (five gold bars)

In 2016, Nick won the silver medal in the Nature category (landscapes and wildlife) in the World Photographic Cup held in Portugal with 28 nations competing with his photo of the Camel Train, Nubra Valley, India ranked number two in the world in that category.

The same photograph was a finalist in the prestigious National Geographic 2016 Travel Photographer of the Year.

Using the Basic Sunny 16 Rule on a Sunny Day

For example, if you were out taking landscape photos on a sunny day, here's how you would know what shutter speed to select without relying on the automatic metering system on your camera.


Simply remember that when shooting at f/16 on a sunny day, the shutter speed should be "equal" to the ISO.

"Equal" in this case means the reciprocal of (i.e. one divided by that number). So, if you're shooting at ISO 100, then your shutter speed would only need to be at 1/100 second for the correct exposure. If you're shooting at ISO 800, then you shutter speed should be set to 1/800s.

Understanding Shutter Speed and Its Connection To ISO

If you are new to photography, then there are some fundamental settings that you should know more about. The first setting is Shutter Speed.

Shutter speed is the duration of time you allow light to fall on the camera's sensor. It's measured in seconds, and a single step doubles or halves the amount of light coming into the camera. In a low light scenario, the camera's shutter needs to be open longer to gather as much light as possible to create an exposure.



In the Simple Sunny 16 Rule example, as there is plenty of light due to a sunning day, the shutter doesn't need to be open for a long time.

So why do you need only to choose an ISO of 100 in this scenario?

To answer this, first, you need to know what ISO does. ISO is the sensitivity of the camera's sensor (or film). The higher the ISO value, the less light is needed to create an equivalent exposure. On your camera, this setting is measured in increments or steps that double or halve in value at each step. You'll

see this when manually changing the setting. ISO starts at 100 on most cameras and changes in individual steps to 200, 400, 800, 1600, 3200, 6400, 12800, and 25600.

As there is plenty of light in our example, the camera doesn't need to make the sensor as sensitive to light. ISO 100 will be enough to create a perfect exposure. If you choose a higher ISO like ISO 200, the resulting picture will become overexposed — assuming all other settings remain the same — as the camera's sensor is twice as sensitive to light compared to ISO 100.

Understanding the Importance of the Exposure Triangle

Now that we understand how ISO and Shutter Speed interact with each other, the aperture is the final element left to discuss. Aperture forms another side of what people call the Exposure Triangle with the two other settings. When you adjust one setting, let's say the aperture, then you need to make the same level of step adjustments to one or both of the other two settings (shutter speed and ISO). By doing so, you won't gain an underexposed or overexposed image but a correctly exposed image.

So, why would you change your aperture? Why not shoot at f/16 all the time?

One reason to change your aperture is to control the amount of subject in focus within the frame. Think of this as creative control.

When you change the aperture, you control the depth of field in a photo. For instance, if you were to increase the opening aperture in the lens to f/4 instead of f/16, the background would appear more out of focus (have more bokeh).

If you took the same photo at f/16, then both the background and foreground would be in focus. So, having a maximum aperture of f/4 provides a more professional-looking photo in this example. You will gain beautiful bokeh in the background, allowing the foreground subject to shine without a distracting background.

The other main reason for opening the hole (aperture) in the lens to a larger size is to let more light through the lens. By doing so, you can reduce the ISO and decrease the time the shutter speed is required to gain a correct exposure. This is very useful if the sun isn't out. The Sunny 16 Rule won't apply if you come across this scenario. So what can you do?

Using the Sunny 16 Rule on Non-Sunny Days

Not all days are sunny, and not all photos will be taken at f/16. This creates a problem for the rule. To overcome the challenge, you need to think about the different apertures and how many steps they are from f/16. Once you have worked out the number of steps, then apply the same number of steps in the opposite direction to both the Shutter Speed and ISO.

This can take time to master as you will need to remember the 'strange' numbers associated with Aperture, Shutter Speed, and ISO. Practice is where you can hone your knowledge.

Using the Basic **Sunny 16 Rule** on a Sunny Day

Below is a guide of the different apertures you may encounter, plus how many stops of difference they are from f/16. Then to the right, you can match up the corresponding ISO, and Shutter Speed needed to gain correct exposure.

Type of Weather	Aperture	Number of Steps	Shutter Speed	ISO
Sunny Day	f/16	0	1/100	100
Partly Cloudy	f/11	1	1/200	200
Cloudy	f/8	2	1/400	400
Overcast	f/5.6	3	1/800	800
Dark Skies	f/4	4	1/1600	1600
Low Light	f/2.8	5	1/3200	3200

No Situation Is Going To Be Perfect

Fortunately, unlike photographers before digital photography, you don't have to carry around a light meter to figure out the appropriate settings. Digital cameras have in-built light meters to do all the metering for you. However, if you rely on the Sunny 16 Rule in the real world, you may face a mixture of lighting scenarios. You should therefore take the above settings as a guide.

In most cases, these settings will work; however, you may need to extend the latitude of steps (or what people refer to as stops) to gain correct exposure. Practice makes perfect, and remember you don't need to go out just on the bright sunny days to create photographs. Some of the best photos are taken in rain, hail, and shine!





2022 Club Subjects

Competition nights are held the third Tuesday of each month. The subjects for the monthly competitions have been set by the Committee and are as follows: Please pay careful attention to the definitions.

JUNE **Nature**

An image in which the dominant content is associated with Autumn and is a double exposure created in camera or in post production.

JULY **Documentary**

Street Photography - A subject lit by light not provided by or under the control of the photographer nor set up specifically for photographic purposes.

(e.g. a picture taken in low-level ambient light in which no supplementary light is added by the photographer).

AUGUST Landscape

(The Grace Munday)

An image depicting some aspect of the weather e.g. storm [actual or impending] rain, hail, snow, fog or wind with a tree as the main subject. Normal sunny conditions or the aftermath are not acceptable

SEPTEMBER Architecture/Mono

A picture featuring steps or stairs either indoors or outdoors.

OCTOBER Abstract

An abstract image. Abstract photography is a method of expressing ideas and emotions with photographed image elements without the intention of creating a traditional or realistic image. By avoiding and going beyond the usual representations of an object, scene, or any particular element, it reveals details that are normally ignored and triggers the viewer's imagination.

NOVEMBER

Documentary

Any subject [including people] photographed in Fremantle. The subject must be seen to be by virtue of appearance, style or use local to Fremantle.

Competition Rules

See the club website for the full competition rules and responsibilities. In summary:

All financial members of the club are eligible to enter monthly competitions to a maximum of one entry in each of the four competitions (print and digital sections, comprising open and set subject, in either colour or monochrome). All images must be the original photographic work of the member, but may be digitally enhanced.

When entering the next competition remember that Gold and Silver award images may not be re-submitted in either digital or print format at another monthly competition. Similarly, images that come very close to resembling a previous Gold or Silver award entry are ineligible for entry in any section. Bronze and other entries may be converted to a higher standard based upon the judge's comments and only re-submitted in one subsequent competition.

Digital Images: Maximum digital image size is 1920(width) x 1080(height) pixels. A different ratio may be applied to the digital image (e.g. square or 'letterbox'), provided the maximum sizes are not exceeded. There is no limit on resolution.

Each digital image must be submitted as a JPEG file (*.jpg) and in sRGB profile and must have the following file title format: Digital Image Title_Open / Subject_Competitor Number.jpg e.g. Snowflakes_Open / Subject_151.jpg. Digital images are to be submitted to the Digital Images Coordinator by emailing them to fremantlecameraclub@gmail. com by 12 noon on the Sunday nine days prior to competition night.

Prints: Maximum print size is 40 x 50cms, including matt and backing. There is no minimum size. Maximum thickness of entry is 5mm, including print, matt and backing. Any print that does not fit within these maximum sizes may not be accepted for competition. Prints may be produced either commercially (i.e. a printing service) or by the member. Print entries must be properly secured to an appropriate backing of either cardboard or foam core. Members must not submit prints that may potentially damage other entries when packed or during transport.

format: Image Title; Open / Subject; and
Competitor Name and number (ie not just
number) e.g. Raindrops; Open / Subject; John

Smith 203, on the reverse side of the print in the top left hand corner of the mount board. This makes it easier to return prints.

Prints must be delivered to the Print Competition table at Club meetings no later than 7:15pm. The prints are to be placed facedown in the relevant competition area ie Subject or Open.

Points will be allocated in the monthly competition on the following basis:

a.	Gold	5 points;
b.	Silver	3 points;
C.	Bronze	2 points; and
d.	Non-winning entry	1 point


