

Beyond Snapshots with Your Smart Phone.

There's no doubt about it. Smart Phones have revolutionised the way we communicate, tell stories and create memories.

Where once the cameras on mobile phones were an afterthought, a bit of a gimmick that helped drive sales, they have become increasingly sophisticated and, in many situations, now rival traditional cameras. Certainly, the algorithms and 'Artificial Intelligence' within modern smart phones very often leave traditional cameras in their wake.

Smart phone photography has generally been pitched at the masses and is responsible for a breath-taking rise in photographs taken over recent years. In 2000, Kodak proudly announced that photographers around the world had taken 80 billion photos; a then record. Now trillions are taken each year, and it's estimated that Instagram alone has around 100 million photos uploaded daily.

Consequently, it's easy to feel as though we're drowning in a sea of images that have, as renowned photographer Eugene Richards said, "been filtered to lend them a patina of polish." We now have a culture more focused on social media 'likes' than art and intentional creativity.

In this environment, do smart phones have a place for serious photographers, those interested in doing more than taking snapshots and using filters; photographers who enjoy the challenge of photography and don't want to relinquish control over their creativity?

These are questions I recall discussing with Dale Neill on several occasions. In a sense, they cut to the core of photography as we have both related. But we've been around a long time and Dale has seen more changes in photography than most of us. He is also a man to look for the silver lining and recalled how many in the photographic community were challenged when digital photography emerged.

At the end of the day, these discussions turned my mind to what smart phones can offer serious photographers; those who want to shoot with a level of intention and creativity.

In my view, they can offer a great deal of opportunity as they are capable of much more than happy snaps for social media. They provide a useful and complementary tool in the photographer's arsenal.

But to do so does require a different mindset, recognising the advantages of having a camera with you all the time, but being aware of the limitations. And of course, knowing how to take control of your phone camera and photographing with intent.

Better Photography

When Can You Break The Rules?

This composition is flawed. It is unbalanced. The interest is all up in the top right handcorner, leaving too much negative space of uninteresting water underneath the trite reflec-tion.

There is too much weight on the left, tilting the image over and tonally, the imageshould be lighter so we can see what's going on.

On the other hand, this is a bold composition. The large area of negative space is inten-tionally sparse in detail, leading the viewer's eye to the top of the composition with thebeautifully shaped headland, the cap of orange grasses and the tiny icebergs floating in-tentionally in the headland's reflection. The colour is similarly minimalistic, the tonal rangedark and moody. And the edge of the shore leads the eye deftly around the frame to thecentre of interest.

Which approach is correct and does it matter? When you've been a magazine editor for aslong as I have, you can start to believe your own rhetoric! However, I think most readerswould agree that no matter what the rules state, if a photography makes you happy, if it'works', then it's a good photo.

As far as you are concerned, of course. I doubt if this photo would do well in a photo com-petition. Perhaps moving those shards of ice into the foreground on the left would breakup the large negative space, making the top-heavy framing more understandable. Thenagain, there are undoubtedly some viewers who feel much as I do and enjoy the image forwhat it is.

What I like about 'breaking the rules' of composition is that you first have to consider them.And in the process of considering the rules, you're intentionally making decisions aboutwhat you like about your subject and how you want it to be presented.

So, when can you break the rules? Whenever you want to, but don't expect the judges in aphoto competition to agree with you. If they do, then that's just a bonus.

2022 Club Subjects

Competition nights are held the third Tuesday of each month. The subjects for the monthly competitions have been set by the Committee and are as follows: Please pay careful attention to the definitions.

AUGUST Landscape

(The Grace Munday)

An image depicting some aspect of the weather e.g. storm [actual or impending] rain, hail, snow, fog or wind with a tree as the main subject. Normal sunny conditions or the aftermath are not acceptable

SEPTEMBER Architecture/Mono

A picture featuring steps or stairs either indoors or outdoors.

OCTOBER Abstract

An abstract image. Abstract photography is a method of expressing ideas and emotions with photographed image elements without the intention of creating a traditional or realistic image. By avoiding and going beyond the usual representations of an object, scene, or any particular element, it reveals details that are normally ignored and triggers the viewer's imagination.

NOVEMBER Documentary

Any subject [including people] photographed in Fremantle. The subject must be seen to be by virtue of appearance, style or use local to Fremantle.

Competition Rules

See the club website for the full competition rules and responsibilities. In summary: All financial members of the club are eligible to enter monthly competitions to a maximum of one entry in each of the four competitions (print and digital sections, comprising open and set subject, in either colour or monochrome). All images must be the original photographic work of the member, but may be digitally enhanced.

When entering the next competition remember that Gold and Silver award images may not be re-submitted in either digital or print format at another monthly competition. Similarly, images that come very close to resembling a previous Gold or Silver award entry are ineligible for entry in any section. Bronze and other entries may be converted to a higher standard based upon the judge's comments and only re-submitted in one subsequent competition.

Digital Images: Maximum digital image size is 1920(width) x 1080(height) pixels. A different ratio may be applied to the digital image (e.g. square or 'letterbox'), provided the maximum sizes are not exceeded. There is no limit on resolution.

Each digital image must be submitted as a JPEG file (*.jpg) and in sRGB profile and must have the following file title format: Digital Image Title_Open / Subject_Competitor Number.jpg e.g. Snowflakes_Open / Subject_151.jpg. Digital images are to be submitted to the Digital Images Coordinator by emailing them to fremantlecameraclub@gmail. com by 12 noon on the Sunday nine days prior to competition night.

Prints: Maximum print size is 40 x 50cms, including matt and backing. There is no minimum size. Maximum thickness of entry is 5mm, including print, matt and backing. Any print that does not fit within these maximum sizes may not be accepted for competition. Prints may be produced either commercially (i.e. a printing service) or by the member. Print entries must be properly secured to an appropriate backing of either cardboard or foam core. Members must not submit prints that may potentially damage other entries when packed or during transport. Each print must be labelled with the following format: Image Title; Open / Subject; and Competitor Name and number (ie not just number) e.g. Raindrops; Open / Subject; John Smith 203, on the reverse side of the print in the top left hand corner of the mount board. This makes it easier to return prints. Prints must be delivered to the Print

Competition table at Club meetings no later than 7:15pm. The prints are to be placed facedown in the relevant competition area ie Subject or Open.

Points will be allocated in the monthly competition on the following basis:

- a. Gold 5 points;
 - Silver 3 points;
 - Bronze 2 points; and
- d. Non-winning entry 1 point
